The 'United Nations' or the UN, is an organization of almost all the countries in the world, created to promote development, peace and security, and human rights.



## HOW MANY CHILDREN ARE TRAFFICKED AND WHY?

It's very difficult to know exactly how many children are trafficked, because many of them don't report it.

More than one third of the reported victims of human trafficking

are children

UN Office on Drugs and Crime says that in 2022, 38% of reported victims are children.

For example, children may not report and ask for help because ...



They fear of being harmed by their traffickers



They also fear that they might get arrested



or maybe there is no way to report it.





Girls tend to be trafficked for the purpose of sexual exploitation, child marriage or for domestic work.





Many boys are trafficked for forced labour and begging on streets.



## WHO CAN BE TRAFFICKED?

Anyone can be trafficked, but this booklet focuses on children.

All children of all ages can be victims of trafficking, but these situations can make children more vulnerable.

### WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE VULNERABLE TO TRAFFICKING?


#### In times of crisis, like war or natural disasters:



families might lose their homes, struggle to find food, and children might not have access to important services like school and healthcare.




Some children might lose their family and might be on the move, alone.



FOR EXAMPLE

Poverty and not having enough food can make children more vulnerable. Sometimes, families are also tricked by traffickers.

### A STORY ABOUT a football player






So the parents agreed to send the boy with the man to another country to play in a professional team.



When the boy arrives in another country, he found out that he is not getting paid at all. The promise was broken.



He is hungry and very tired. But he can't go home. He doesn't know anyone or how to report and ask for help.





#### FOR EXAMPLE

Children who are displaced can be more vulnerable. Armed conflict and violence in a community or climate change and natural disasters (for example, earthquakes, hurricanes and floods) can cause children and families to be displaced.

## WHO ARE THE **TRAFFICKERS?**

Those who commit these crimes are called traffickers.

They may act alone or as part of criminal networks to recruit. transport and exploit children within and across countries.



Traffickers use techniques to make children feel special and get close to them or to their family with a purpose to force, trick or persuade children to exploit them.



Traffickers are not always strangers. They might be someone children know or trust.

## TECHNOLOGIES MAKE IT EASIER FOR TRAFFICKERS

### A STORY ABOUT intimate photos and videos

This is an example of how technology is used to trick and exploit children.

They talked every day. They have not met in-

person yet, but they

girlfriend and bovfriend.

Child trafficking happens in person, but digital technologies are used more and more to trick children into being trafficked.

For example, traffickers use technologies like social media and chat to find and contact children and also to contact other criminals involved.





Also, technologies help criminals be anonymous, making it harder to find them when they are committing a crime.





It can help find, recruit and manipulate victims.



It can be used to create false documents and identities that can be misused by traffickers.



Or to create images and videos used by traffickers to force children to do things that are harmful to them.

One day the boy asks the girl to share videos and photos of herself in ways that are inappropriate, hurtful, and wrong.

The boy was actually a man in his 30s, who is a part of a criminal group. He is selling these images and videos to strangers and making money from them.

The girl was being tricked to believe that he was her boyfriend, and he cared about her.



A few days later, she receives a text message from the man saying that if she doesn't pay him money, he will share the inappropriate photos of her to the entire school.



## The Way Forward

The world is facing a child rights crisis, but more people are aware of the problem and they are working together!

Inter-Agency Coordination Group against Trafficking in Persons

That's why the **United Nations** coordinates a special group called '**ICAT: the Inter-Agency Coordination Group Against Trafficking in Persons**', and they came up with a set of recommendations for governments and other organizations.

For example, in **November 2024**, representatives of around **120 countries** came together in Bogota, Colombia to discuss how to end all forms of violence against children.

At the conference, **the countries made promises** (called pledges**) on what they would do to protect children** from violence.

Children need to be a part of this work! Children know what they need and adults need to listen carefully.




There has to be an easy way for children to report to the authority and ask for help.
